- ✚ The C.A.R.E (Centre for Ambitious and Resourceful Endeavours) is functioning within the campus of Avinashilingam University for women. The main aim of the centre is to help the students have access to counselling both career and personal. It also facilitates students in having their self assessment on varied attributes.
- ✚ The Centre is functioning under the auspices of the Psychology Department. The post graduate students of the department under the guidance of the staff carry out the Myers Briggs Type Personality mapping on all out going students of the Engineering program by handing out a report that would help in their career.
- ✚ The Comprehensive Interest Schedule is administered on all the under graduate students of the Arts and Science stream, to identify their area of interest in paving the way for choice in higher studies, be meaningfully employed or further still knowing their self potentials.
- ✚ The faculty members of the Department of Psychology have been extending psychological counselling services to the students and also the members of the society. The common issues addressed include learning difficulties, adjustment problems, marital problems, *anxiety and depression*.

Career guidance

- ✓ The support of the Career guidance and Counselling cell that the institution extends to the students makes them confident to perform better in their career. Counselling, thus addresses both the academic and the career concerns and opportunities. The institution inculcates a positive attitude and a value added service to the students. The spirit of offering guidance on sharing resources, awareness on availability of opportunities and facilities, information and guidance about market patterns and grooming the employability skills that help in building a base for the students is exercised through the career and counselling cell, as a result of socio economic integration.

- ✓ Soft skills, such as, being able to work well with others, leadership, work ethics, manners and social interaction, are vital for success in the marketplace, and therefore these skills are often imbibed to the students by means of workshop, seminars and activity based sessions. Students are taught to enhance their communication skills through functional English classes and are taught on how to communicate with peers and bosses and how to research the job market. Career counselling also emphasis the spirit of developing self awareness and maintain self-esteem.
- ✓ Organising mock tests and interviews prior to the campus interviews is a continuous process. Industry experts are invited to address the students to create awareness to job description and industry expectations.
- ✓ The students are encouraged to register for all banking exams, service commission exams and adequate training is provided in this regard. The students are guided for pursuing higher education, overseas education etc., Industry collaborated training is given for the students from reserved category and economically weaker section. A special recruitment drive is organized for such trained students.
- ✓ Workshops are organized for Person with Disabilities with computer based applications and on building Self Confidence. To trigger the entrepreneurship skills among students, various workshops and seminars are organized to make the students job providers than to be job seekers.
- ✓ For the academic year 2016 – 2017, 65 companies made their recruitment process and 431 students were placed in different sectors. The career guidance and counselling cell operates in enhancing and facilitating the students to find a path for career and opportunities that leads to a quality living.

(i). Title of the Practice

1. Student Evaluation System

2. Goal

The teaching learning process in higher education system needs proper evaluation methodology both for teaching and learning. A structured systematic pattern of internal and external evaluation is required for the continuous assessment of the performance of the students. Accountability of teaching may be measured only by the performance of students. Therefore foolproof system of evaluation has been structured which is also very essential for the vertical growth of the taught. The guidelines of choice based credit system formulated by stakeholders of higher education are mandatory for implementation to achieve quality education and to arise to global standards.

3. The Context

❖ Implementation of e-Governance in the Examination Section

The monitoring and evaluation of the institutional processes require a carefully structured system of internal and external introspection. e-Governance of Examination module in the University facilitates in improving transparency, providing speedy information, dissemination, improving administrative efficiency and public services related to examination .Implementation of e-Governance helps to monitor academic standards related to examination and evaluation. It helps in the continuous monitoring, assessment and meaningful evaluation of the teacher and the student. A well organized Examination Section maintains utmost confidentiality with special reference to the setting and printing of the question papers and valuation of the answer scripts and with restricted permission to the Section even to the faculty members. These are possible as the section is equipped with quality and hi-end infrastructure.

4. The Practice

- ✓ The University website has 'Examination' menu in the home page with sub menus: Examination, Results, Time Table, Re-valuation, Retotalling and Transparency, Degree Certificate, Migration Certificate, Duplicate Certificate, Genuinity of Statement, Syllabus copy with all these details updated every time.
- ✓ The Continuous Internal Assessment Tests Time Table for all programmes will be uploaded 15 days prior to the commencement of the tests. The End Semester Examination Time Table for all programmes will be uploaded 30 days prior to the commencement of the Examination.
- ✓ Two days after the Result Passing Board Meeting, the results of the Semester Examinations will be uploaded in the University website.
Fifteen working days after the last day of the End Semester Examination, meeting of the Result Passing Board will be convened to discuss the performance of the students of all programmes and to analyze the results. Two days later, after incorporating the modification if any, the results of each student will be uploaded in the University website.
- ✓ Two major components of assessment-Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and Comprehensive Examination (CE) - Undergraduate Programme-CIA:CE break up is 50:50 and for Postgraduates, it is 40:60. The Internal Assessment components include - continuous internal assessment tests and assignments for UG and continuous internal assessment tests, assignments and seminars for PG. Selected papers are 100% internal-like Practical's inbuilt theory papers, multidisciplinary courses, etc.. Value added Courses, Co-curricular Courses, Professional Certification Courses, National Service Scheme, National Cadet Corps, Sports and Skill based Courses are evaluated and marks are transformed into remarks.

❖ Attendance Norms to appear for End Semester Examinations (Applicable to the students from 2012-13 and onwards)

Theory Papers

- (i) For direct appearance including on duty, a student should have an attendance of minimum 75% per semester in a 90 teaching days schedule.
- (ii) Students with 65 – 74 % attendance may be permitted to appear for the examination with the permission of HoD and Dean.
- (iii) In case attendance is 50 – 64 %, the student will be debarred from the current examination (odd) but can proceed to the even semester and compensate the lack of attendance in the even semester. She will be permitted to write the arrears if any.
- (iv) If the student lacks attendance in the odd semester and not able to compensate in the even semester, she has to re-register.
- (v) In case the student lacks attendance in the even semester, the overall attendance in the academic year will be considered.
- (vi) If the student fails to compensate, she has to repeat the semester from where she lost the attendance.

Practical's Papers

The student should have completed 75% of the experiments for each practicals paper for direct appearance including on duty.

Missed practical experiments have to be compensated in extra hours before the commencement of the End Semester Practical Examinations with the permission of the Head of the Department.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

1. Evaluation mechanisms may be still modified to identify and promote good teaching practices.
2. Additional or alternate methods of assessment / evaluation beyond those listed may be incorporated into courses based on industry standards and program requirements
3. Regulations and guidelines being proposed by the governing agencies should be maintained for atleast five years without revisions, so that a constant structure may be maintained for this period.
4. All the components of evaluation - both internal and external – and the breakup of marks and grading pattern should be made uniform throughout the nation in all universities which is the main objective of choice based credit system. Only then, it will favour easy mobility for the students across the country.
5. The days devoted for continuous internal assessment tests at times makes the working days insufficient for devoting to teaching and learning process.
6. More financial assistance may be given for complete automation of the evaluation processes and for easy access of the data of each student between various institutions across the country.

7. Notes (Optional)

All the guidelines proposed by UGC have been adopted regarding evaluation process- the ten point scale pointed out for credits and grades, security measures in mark sheets, ratio of external and internal examiners for central valuation, external examiners for practical examinations, individual assignments, seminars, mini projects, self study papers and open book papers including completion of the programmes with clearance of all arrears within a period of N+2 years, where N is the regular programme period. Students are given the chance for revaluation and retotalling of their answer scripts, retests in continuous internal assessment if they are absent for genuine reasons. The result passing board helps in identifying fast and slow learners, hard question papers, out of syllabus questions, covering of syllabus by teachers and scale of moderation to be applied.

1. Annual Academic and Administrative Audit

2. Goal

Assessment of the academic activities and efficiency of the administrative procedures may throw light on the quality of education imparted by an educational institute and globally acceptable standard of the curriculum. Monitoring the implementation of the guidelines of the University Grants Commission updated frequently in order to maintain the quality and standard of higher education throughout the nation is very important. Auditing the entire procedures followed in an educational institution through the inspection by external experts is required to assess the level of fulfilment of the requirements. Feedback from various level stakeholders namely, administrators, faculty members, students, parents, industries and the community will give more insight into this aspect.

3. The Context

Needs and demands of the educational institutions, curriculum restructure, introduction of innovative programmes, functioning of the departments and faculty members, research avenues, funded projects, publications ,extension activities, infrastructure and administrative mechanisms are considered bench mark for the growth and development of institutes of higher education. Criticisms and suggestions by visiting expert teams to the departments and administration sections will give opportunity for academic excellence and administrative reforms. Functional autonomy and financial management may be considered two important factors for the success of academic and administrative assessment. Quality education with standard curriculum and globally acceptable system of education evolved certain benchmarks for ascertaining and ensuring quality at different levels of Higher Education and for its continued sustenance. During the last ten years, Universities in India have taken serious note of these emerging needs and demands and try to update the curriculum, design new programs and offer better educational services while maintaining high quality.

The objective of Academic and Administrative Audit is to evaluate the performance of the institution and to identify the issues that are to be attended in order to improve the quality of Teaching and Research.

- ✚ To understand the existing system and assess the strengths and weaknesses of the Departments and Administrative Units and to suggest the methods for improvement and for overcoming the weaknesses in teaching, learning and evaluation, student support and progression.
- ✚ To ascertain whether the Departments / Centres are functioning efficiently and effectively with proven records of capacity building, research projects and publications and extension over a period of time or not.
- ✚ To identify the bottlenecks in the existing administrative mechanisms and to identify the opportunities for academic reforms, administrative reforms and examination reforms for a long term progression with excellence and to face the challenges of Internationalization in Higher Education.

The details were: Curriculum, Curriculum Transaction, Faculty Profile, Students Profile, Infrastructure, Activities of the Department, SWOC Analysis, Best Practice and Future Plan.
2. The administrative audit was conducted for the administrative sections-Computer Centre, Medical Centre, National Social Service Cell, National Cadet Corps Cell, Sports Centre, Equal Opportunity Cell, Women Study Centre, Ambedhkar Study Centre, Examination Section and Library.
3. Submission of a list of four subject experts by each Department / Centre to the Vice Chancellor for selection of two among them for each department .
4. Conduct of Academic and Administrative Audit by the visit of the experts to each Department / Centre and inspection of the records, evidences and infrastructure and interaction with faculty members.

5. Entry of the feedback of the subject experts in the Evaluation Report and consolidation of the same.
6. The details inspected were department profile, student enrolment, faculty strength and qualification, infrastructure facilities including class rooms, laboratories, equipment, non teaching staff, computers, printers and copiers, foreign visits, visiting professors, membership in academic societies, students achievement, students feedback on teaching methods, updating of current concepts in the subject, teachers role in motivating the students in progression , extension activities , awards received by faculty members, conferences and seminars organized and attended, research projects sanctioned, publications of books and research articles, placement details of students, alumni status, study tours and field visits and details of link with industries, system of administration, role of administrators and bondage and link between academic and administrative modalities.
